Wild Turkeys, New Hampshire's Conservation Succes Story

Spring turkey season is upon us, but hunting these large birds would have been unthinkable in New Hampshire just a few decades ago. In the 1960's, when the New Hampshire Fish and Game Department was publishing data on game availability, it was reported that there were no wild turkeys anywhere in the state. In fact, the last wild turkey had been spotted in the Granite State more than 100 years ago in 1857 (Yankee Magazine, 2014). Habitat loss and a lack of hunting regulations throughout the 18th and 19th centuries had destroyed the native turkey population. But now, the turkey population in New Hampshire is well over 50,000 throughout the state, and these flocks seem to grow each year.

Attempts to reintroduce turkeys to New England were first made in the 1960's, but it was not until 1975 that the practice began to yield positive results. Wild turkeys that had been trapped in New York and Pennsylvania were released into the Connecticut River Valley and, as this first flock grew, the turkeys were relocated throughout the state (New Hampshire Magazine, 2012). With judicious management, habitat regrowth, and monumental efforts from wildlife biologists across the state, the wild turkey population exploded.

In 1985, just ten years after the first successful reintroduction of turkeys

to the state, New Hampshire opened its first permitted turkey hunting season. Even with hunting, the population continues to grow year over year prompting the addition of a second turkey tag available in the spring season, as well as a second hunting season in the fall. Even with the success of our turkey population, the NH Fish and Game department continues their efforts to manage both habitat and hunter success to ensure continued growth.

Current regulations specify that only turkeys with a beard may be hunted in the spring (usually these are toms and jakes, though occasionally a hen may have a beard). Turkey hunting also ends at noon every day, as hens usually only leave their nests in the warmer afternoon. Both of these regulations help to prevent the accidental targeting of breeding hens and ensure a healthy new generation of turkeys will hatch later in the spring. Efforts are also being made to diversify New Hampshire's habitat, as turkeys require old-growth and successional forests, as well as open fields, to thrive (New Hampshire Fish and Game Department). When you are hunting this year and you feel like you can't find a single tom in the whole state, remember that just 50 years ago there actually weren't any turkeys at all!
